



Items Accepted

- Commercial Fireworks, Safe and Sane Fireworks

Items not accepted

- Explosive devices or ammunition (Call your local bomb squad immediately)
- Any fireworks and/or aerial shells classified as DOT 1.3 or greater
- Homemade fireworks, chemicals, loose pyrotechnic powders, black powder, and smokeless powder.
- Fuzees, flares, electric matches, and blasting caps.
- Non-fireworks related evidence or contraband (weapons, drugs, paraphernalia, etc.)
- Damaged or wet fireworks.
- Lighters, matches, trash including expended fireworks.



THE ENVIRONMENTAL COST OF ONLINE RETURNS



Online shopping was a convenient alternative to hitting the mall even before the pandemic. When the pandemic hit, online shopping also became the safest way to stock up. Digital sales ballooned 71% in the second quarter of 2020 and 55% in the third as people started shopping online; even for many items that are easier to buy in person, like jeans or produce. You might not be able to send lettuce back to the grocery store, but by now most of us have gotten very familiar with online retailers' return policies for other products. Free returns help shoppers get exactly what they want, but it has serious repercussions for the environment.

Bracketing

Bracketing is the industry term for a “buy now, choose later” approach to online shopping. It's buying an article of clothing in two sizes because you're not sure which one will fit or buying all three colors of an item to see which looks best in person. Bracketing is good for retailers and consumers. Retailers know that generous return policies give customers confidence to purchase items online. Consumers eliminate the risk in purchasing an item they've never seen before. In 2020, nearly two-thirds of shoppers bought multiples of the same item with the intention of returning some of them.

We all realize that returning items results in extra carbon emissions from transportation. In the U.S., return shipping creates over 15 million metric tons of carbon dioxide emissions annually – more than the emissions from 3 million cars. But most people assume that returned goods are simply resold, the same way that items discarded in a dressing room or left in a shopping cart are reshelved for sale in a store. Unfortunately, that's not always true.

Environmental Cost of Online Returns

Up to 30% of all online purchases are returned. But some aspects of the returns process haven't been well documented yet. The Internet Society Foundation recently awarded a grant for the first full life cycle study of the environmental impacts of product returns to the Project on the Energy and Environmental Implications of the Digital Economy.

Information on what happens to returned item's packaging is limited. But damage during return shipping, and unpacking for inspection before resale, increase the likelihood of shipping resold items in new packaging. Overall, only about 54% of packaging gets recycled.

Manufacturers expect a significant percentage of their products to go to waste. So they intentionally produce more than they expect to sell to ensure that there will be enough of whatever sizes or models prove to be “keepers.” Quantifying the amount of waste related to intentional overproduction is nearly impossible. But even without comprehensive data, it's obvious that the environmental cost of online returns is significant. Five billion pounds of returned goods end up in U.S. landfills each year. Less than half of returned goods are resold at full price. Sometimes it's cheaper to throw away merchandise than to repackage, re-inventory, store it, resell it, and ship it out again. Amazon (responsible for about 40% of

online sales in the U.S.) sells tons of returned inventory to e-commerce liquidation websites; it's hard to track that merchandise. But there's evidence that a lot of liquidated merchandise ends up in the landfill anyway.


Solutions

France is taking the lead in reducing waste from unsold and returned goods. In what may be the first law of its kind in the world, in 2020 the French parliament banned companies from throwing away many kinds of unsold goods. Now producers must reuse, redistribute, or recycle unsold products.

Retailers can reduce returns by providing accurate, detailed product photos and descriptions to help shoppers know exactly what they are ordering. New technology and shipping strategies can also make the returns process less wasteful. For example, ZigZag is a platform that helps retailers consolidate returns in a network of warehouses for bulk reverse shipping. Happy Returns employs reusable containers to consolidate and bulk-ship box-free returns at hubs in California and Pennsylvania. Startups like RePack and LimeLoop offer reusable shipping pouches for online apparel orders. Merchandise can also be stored locally and shipped directly to a new customer.

Individual consumers have a part to play, too. When shopping online, take the extra time to research products carefully. Only order what you truly expect to keep and use. Shopping more mindfully is shopping less wastefully.





April 24, 2021 is National Prescription Drug Take Back Day



On April 24, 2021 from 10am to 2pm the Highland Police Station and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public its 19th opportunity in nine years to prevent pill abuse and theft by raiding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, or unwanted prescription drugs.

We encourage every citizen to look in their homes for any old, unused prescription medication and bring your medications for disposal to the **Highland Police Station located at 26985 Base Line Highland, CA 92346** on Saturday, April 24, 2021 from 10am to 2pm. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.



Americans turned in more unused prescription drugs at the most recent DEA National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day than on any of the previous 19 events since it began in 2010, demonstrating their understanding of the value of this service.

Last October, the public turned in a record-setting amount of nearly one million pounds—nearly 492.7 tons of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs for disposal at close to 4,587 collection sites all across the country. This brings the total amount of prescription drugs collected by DEA since the fall of 2010 to 13,684,848 pounds or 6842.4 tons.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Rates of prescription drug abuse in the U.S. are alarmingly high, as are the number of accidental poisonings and overdoses due to these drugs. Studies show that a majority of abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet. Also, Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards. “Educating the public on the proper disposal of unused medicines has led to over 6,800 tons of prescription drugs being turned in. The success of this program is evident; I believe residents are aware of this every six-month service being provided to them and, they plan for it,” said Sheriff John McMahon.

Background

Two LifeStream bloodmobiles must be retired soon because they no longer meet State and Federal vehicle emissions standards.

The Need

Replacing these bloodmobiles with new, more environmentally friendly bloodmobiles can keep LifeStream “going to the donor” at schools, churches, hospitals, businesses, and government offices to collect life-saving blood. New bloodmobiles cost approximately \$250,000 each!

The Solution

From January through April, LifeStream is conducting their **2 for 2 Community Campaign**. They are asking blood donors, the public, small businesses, large companies, and corporate and community foundations to donate to our campaign. If everyone pitches in, they should easily reach the goal of raising \$500,000.

Why Are Bloodmobiles Important?



Bloodmobiles are an essential component of LifeStream’s blood collection efforts and make it convenient for donors to give the gift of blood. In a typical year, 72,000 units (pints) are collected from mobile blood drives to help trauma and cancer patients, and for surgeries at local hospitals and medical facilities. Without bloodmobiles, LifeStream would not be able to meet local patients’ needs.

Mobile staff also provides blood donors with valuable health information during the screening process. In 2019, LifeStream provided “mini-physicals” to 125,000 blood donors. These “mini-physicals” assessed each person’s pulse, temperature, blood pressure, cholesterol, and hemoglobin. All blood donations are also tested for infectious diseases and the presence of COVID antibodies.

Once items are added to their cart, customers will be able to select how much of their benefits they would like to allocate to the order.
