The 2022 Redlands Bicycle Classic — April 20, 2022

The 2022 Redlands Bicycle Classic is excited to announce that the initial stage of this year's race will occur on Wednesday, April 20, 2022, in the City of Highland. We would like to thank all of the residents and businesses along the course for their assistance and patience, as we bring you one of the premier cycling events in the country.

The Highland Stage is a “circuit” race, which means the cyclists will be completing numerous laps around the course. This will give you an opportunity to see them up close and cheer them on as they pass by your location. Spectators may walk along the outside of the course, however, please be sure to stay off the course itself. The riders will be exceeding 50 MPH at times, and we want to ensure your safety, as well as the safety of the riders. **With safety as our top primary concern, there will be some local street closures in place throughout the day.**

6:00am to 4:00pm — Eastbound Base Line between Streater Avenue and Church Street will be closed Westbound Base Line will be reduced to one lane in this location (Immanuel Baptist Church access will be via the Streater Avenue driveway only), Greenspot Road and Highland Avenue are the best alternate routes.



8:00am to 3:00pm — Jack Rabbit Lane between Church Street and Foxtail Way, Foxtail Way between Jack Rabbit Lane and Glenheather Drive, Glenheather Drive between Foxtail Way and Tonner Drive, Tonner Drive between Glenheather Drive and Orange Street, Orange Street between Tonner Drive and Sycamore Drive, Sycamore Drive between Orange Street and Webster Street, Webster Street between Sycamore Drive and Base Line.



8:05am to 2:00pm — Church Street between Base Line and Greenspot Road will be closed in both directions, Arroyo Verde traffic (including Kindergarten pickup/drop off) should access the lower parking lot using northbound Church Street from Greenspot Road. Church Street will reopen as soon as the race ends to facilitate end-of-school dismissal.




Traffic will be impacted in the area of Highland Grove Elementary and Beattie Middle School. Use Orange Street via Greenspot Road and Webster Street via Boulder Avenue to access these schools. As race day approaches, individual schools will provide detailed instructions through recorded messages. Please drive cautiously!

If you anticipate leaving your business or residence during race time, please understand that there may be a delay, as our marshals must wait until there are no cyclists approaching before they allow you on the course. At that time, you will be allowed onto the course, but only in the direction of the race, and you will be required to exit the course at the next opportunity. Refer to the attached map to determine the direction the race will be traveling. If you are having difficulty getting to a specific location, contact one of our marshals or a law enforcement official. Our marshals will be strategically placed throughout the course to assist you in getting where you need to go. If you need to leave a residence on the course while the race is in progress, it is imperative that you seek assistance from a marshal before exiting. If possible, please park your vehicle on a street off of the course ahead of time.

For those who live on the course, temporary no parking signs will be posted several days prior to the race. For your convenience, a map of this year's course is included. The streets in bold will have parking restrictions. Vehicles must be removed from the course by 11:59 pm on Tuesday, April 19 (eight hours before the race begins). Any vehicles remaining on the course are subject to removal. Towed vehicles will be taken to the southwest parking lot of Immanuel Baptist Church. Finally, *loose dogs present a significant hazard to cyclists traveling at high speeds*. Please ensure that your pet is secured during the event.



Funding Currently Available!!!



The City of Highland is encouraging small businesses in Highland to apply for the Coronavirus Recovery Fund grant program. First launched in September 2021, the purpose of this program is to provide financial assistance to City-based small businesses impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Successful grant recipients will receive a one-time \$7,500 disbursement.

Businesses that meet these specific criteria are eligible for consideration:

- Must have a physical location within the City of Highland (store front, office, commercial structure).
- Be in good standing with the City of Highland (**current/valid business license, no outstanding code enforcement actions, or compliance orders**).
- Must have no more than 100 employees.
- Must be in existence as of August 24, 2021.

SOUND THE ALARM - SIGN UP FOR FREE SMOKE ALARM INSTALLATION!

The American Red Cross has started a new program. Under normal circumstances, the Red Cross partners up with volunteers to canvas neighborhoods to install free smoke alarms in homes, replace batteries in existing alarms and help families create home fire escape plans. Unfortunately, COVID has prevented them from hosting rally events of this type. The modified program is now an appointment based, "hot shot" program. This program will consist of installing FREE smoke alarms and providing home fire safety education to residents by appointment only.



The installation service and the home fire preparedness education are FREE to the resident. After signing up, a Red Cross volunteer will contact the resident to schedule the appointment.

Volunteers will be following all COVID-19 precautions before entering the home and while in the home. Working smoke alarms save lives! IMPORTANT SAFETY SKILLS

Learn First Aid and CPR - Take a first aid and CPR class. You can get more information about training from your local American Red Cross chapter. Getting certified protects you under Good Samaritan laws if you must give first aid. Get more information about the supplies in a first aid kit.

Learn to Use a Fire Extinguisher - Have at least one up-to-date fire extinguisher and let everyone in your household know where it's kept and how to use it. You should have an ABC type at minimum. The U.S. Fire Administration says you should only use a fire extinguisher if you've been trained in its proper use and maintenance. Contact your local fire department for information on training in your area. Get more information about preparedness for a fire emergency.

KNOW HOW TO SHUT OFF YOUR UTILITIES

Natural Gas - Natural gas leaks and explosions cause a significant number of fires after disasters. It's important that all household members know how to shut off natural gas. There are different gas shut-off procedures for different gas meter configurations, so it's important to call your gas company. They can help you prepare for gas appliances and gas service to your home in the event of an emergency. Make sure everyone in your household knows the proper shut-off procedure for your meter. Do not actually turn off the gas when practicing shutting it off.

- If you smell gas or hear a blowing or hissing noise, open a window, and get everyone out quickly. Turn off the gas using the outside main valve if you can and call the gas company from a neighbor's home. Caution: If you turn off the gas for any reason, only a qualified professional can turn it back on. NEVER attempt to turn the gas back on yourself.

Water - Water quickly becomes a precious resource following many disasters. It is important that everyone in your household learn how to shut off the main water valve to the house.

- Find the shut-off valve for the main water line that enters your house and tag it for easy identification. Make sure everyone in your household knows where it is.
- Make sure you can shut the valve off completely. Your valve may be rusted open, or it may not close all the way. If so, replace it.
- Cracked lines may pollute the water supply to your house. It's a good idea to shut off your water until authorities say it's safe to drink.

The effects of gravity may drain the water in your hot water heater and toilet tanks unless you trap it in your house by shutting off the main house valve. (This is not the street valve in the cement box at the curb – the street valve is extremely difficult to turn and requires a special tool.)


Electricity - Electrical sparks can ignite natural gas if it is leaking. Teach all responsible household members how to shut off the electricity.

- Locate your electrical circuit box. For your safety, always shut off all the individual circuits before shutting off the main circuit.

National Prescription Drug Take Back Day

On April 30, 2022 the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) will give the public its 22nd opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs.



We encourage every citizen to look in their homes for any old, unused prescription medication and bring your medications for disposal to the **Highland Police Station located at 26985 Base Line Highland, CA 92346**, on Saturday, April 30th, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.


Americans turned in more unused prescription drugs at the most recent DEA National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day than on any of the previous twenty-one events since it began in 2010, demonstrating their understanding of the value of this service. Last year the DEA and over 4,200 of its state, local, and tribal law enforcement partners collected 744,082 pounds of unwanted medicines—about 372 tons—at almost 5,000 sites spread through all 50 states. The top five states with the largest collections, in order, were Wisconsin (57 tons); Texas (almost 56 tons); Ohio (almost 47 tons); California (almost 42 tons); and Florida (almost 33 tons).

The majority of prescription drug abusers report in surveys that they get their drugs from friends and family. Americans understand that cleaning out old prescription drugs from medicine cabinets, kitchen drawers, and bedside tables reduces accidents, thefts, and the misuse and abuse of these medicines, including the opioid painkillers that accounted for 20,808 drug overdoses—78 a day—in 2014 (the most recent statistics from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention). 8 out of 10 new heroin users began by abusing prescription painkillers and moved to heroin when they could no longer obtain or afford those painkillers.

“These results show that more Americans than ever are taking the important step of cleaning out their medicine cabinets and making homes safe from potential prescription drug abuse or theft,” said DEA Acting Administrator Chuck Rosenberg. “Unwanted, expired, or unused prescription medications are often an unintended catalyst for addiction. Take-Back events like this raise awareness of the opioid epidemic and offer the public a safe and anonymous way to help prevent substance abuse.”

Americans are now advised that their usual methods for disposing of unused medicines—flushing them down the toilet or throwing them in the trash—both pose potential safety and health hazards.

What You Should Know About Street Sweeping in Highland

1) Help us to serve you better by removing all possible obstacles from the street on your scheduled day. Although the City of Highland does not enforce street sweeping parking restrictions, we appreciate your assistance in keeping the streets clear on your scheduled day.

Parked vehicles cause the operator to swing wide to miss them. Moving vehicles off a street scheduled for sweeping allows crews to thoroughly clean the street from curb-to-curb. One parked car equals nearly three car lengths of space that can't be swept because the street sweeping equipment must leave room to avoid it. This can result in debris building up on the roadway and entering the storm drain which can cause flooding during heavy rains and contribute to water pollution.

2) In residential areas the street sweeper can sweep **anytime** from 6am to 6pm, the day after your solid waste collection day.

3) If solid waste collection is delayed one day due to a holiday, the street sweeper will be delayed one day as well.

4) Since sweeping is done as close to the curb as possible, things like overhanging tree branches, basketball hoops, solid waste collection carts and especially parked vehicles cause the operator to swing wide to miss them. When this happens, debris is left on the street and the quality of the sweeping is reduced.

5) Street sweeping also serves as one of our Best Management Practices (BMP) to control and improve water quality.




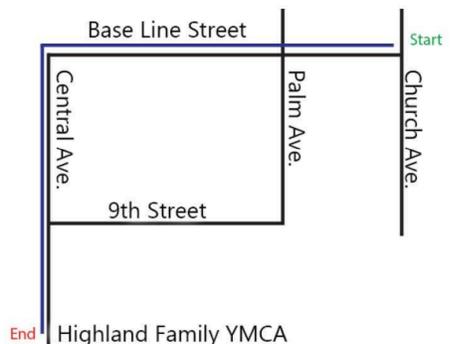

WASH YOUR CAR THE ECO-FRIENDLY WAY!

When possible, wash in a professional car wash.

- 1 **Locate** the nearest storm drain and ensure that wash water does not flow into it.



- 2 **Wash** in a contained area or on grass*, gravel or other permeable surface. Dispose of excess soapy water into the sanitary sewer (*ie. sink or toilet*) or onto grass.

- 3 **Use** eco-friendly cleaning products (*non-toxic, phosphate free or biodegradable*). Use as little soap as possible and wipe brake dust off tires with a rag before washing.

- 4 **Conserve** water by using a high pressure hose and turn off the water when not in use.

*Some local ordinances may not allow a car to be parked on the front lawn. Check with your City's Building and Code department if you are unsure.

How Does Eco Car Washing Help Local Waterways?

When excess wash water travels through the street it has the potential to pick up oil, grease and other chemicals along the way before it ends up in the curb, gutter and the storm drain system. **This contaminated water then travels to our creeks and the Santa Ana River making it unsafe for people and wildlife.**

Sustainable Practices for Landscape Maintenance

Your contributions make a difference in the way you maintain your yard. Learn how to truly be a “green” thumb and prevent stormwater pollution.

Recycle Yard Waste



Yard waste, like grass and leaves, can block the storm drain or carry harmful chemicals into it.

- Recycle yard waste by placing them into your greenwaste container.
- Do not blow, sweep, rake, or hose yard waste into the street or catch basin.
- Try grasscycling by leaving clippings on the lawn when mowing.

Use Safe Products



Fertilizers, herbicides, and pesticides are often carried into the storm drain by sprinkler runoff.

- Use natural and non-toxic alternatives as often as possible.
- Spot-apply, rather than blanketing entire areas.

Apply chemicals directly to the area that needs treatment.

- Read the product label and use only as directed.
- Never apply before a rain.

Use Water Wisely



Conserving water minimizes the amount of urban runoff going into the street.

- Control the amount of water and direction of sprinklers.

The average lawn only needs about an inch of water a week or 10 to 20 minutes of watering.

- Periodically inspect and fix sprinklers for leaks.

Realign sprinkler heads to make sure water is distributed onto the lawn and not onto the sidewalk.

- Plant native vegetation to reduce the need of water.



HOMEOWNERS

Keep these tips in mind when hiring professional landscapers and remind them as necessary.



Leftover pesticides, fertilizers, and herbicides contaminate landfills and should be disposed of through a Household Hazardous Waste Center*.



Prácticas Sostenibles para el Mantenimiento de Jardinería

Recicle los Residuos de Jardín



Los desechos de jardín, como la hierba y las hojas, pueden bloquear el drenaje pluvial o transportar productos químicos dañinos.

- Recicle los desechos del jardín colocándolos en su contenedor verde de desechos.
- No sople, barra, rastrille ni riegue los desechos del patio en la calle o en la cuneta.
- Intente reciclar el césped dejando los recortes sobre el césped.

Use Productos Seguros



Los fertilizantes, herbicidas y pesticidas a menudo son arrastrados al drenaje pluvial a través del agua sobrante proveniente de los rociadores.

- Use alternativas naturales y no tóxicas con la mayor frecuencia posible.
- Aplique los productos en las áreas específicas que requiera tratamiento en lugar de cubrir áreas enteras.
- Lea la etiqueta del producto y use solo como se indica.
- Nunca aplique antes de una lluvia.

Use el Agua de Forma Inteligente



La conservación del agua minimiza la cantidad de escorrentía que va a la calle a través del agua sobrante.

- Controle la cantidad de agua y la dirección de los rociadores.

El césped promedio solo necesita aproximadamente una pulgada de agua por semana, incluida la lluvia, o 10 a 20 minutos de riego.

- Inspeccione y repare periódicamente los rociadores para detectar fugas y goteos.

Realíe las cabezas de los rociadores para asegurarse de que el agua se distribuya en el césped y no en la acera.

- Plante vegetación autóctona para reducir la necesidad de agua.

Tenga en cuenta estos consejos al contratar jardineros profesionales y haga que los mantengan presente como sea necesario.
