

26th Annual Community Trails Day

Saturday, June 4

8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

The City of Highland is hosting its 26th Annual Highland Community Trails Day. This year's selected trail route for hiking or walking is City Creek Levee Trail, which will start at Canyon Oaks Park, hiking north to Highland Avenue, and looping to the second segment of the trail. This loop is approximately 2.33 miles long.

Hikers can take a side trip from the Canyon Oak Park and visit the Browning Road Trail (approximately .63 miles) and loop back to the City Creek Levee Trail to finish the trail walk with a total hike of 2.96 miles. Along the City Creek Levee Trail Loop hikers have the option of visiting various integrative sign stations along the trail which includes signs that show the history of the City.



The Highland Fire Department will be present with a fire truck on display for the children to see up close. The Highland H.I.T Team will be conducting an early morning clean up before the start of the event along with the Highland Police Department who will be canvassing the area to ensure safety.


Memorial Day Ceremony

Effective June 1, 2022 the City will no longer be issuing a new tag when renewing your dog license. Your current tag will remain assigned to your dog indefinitely. If you lose your tag, you can request a replacement for a \$5 fee.

This change does not affect the renewal process and you are still required to renew your license when your current one expires. TAKING OUT THE TRASH

A chore almost no one likes. Bins that are broken in the middle, are missing wheels, have cracked lids or have no lids at all can make this bit of domestic drudgery worse by the condition of the bin. **Is your container damaged** (i.e., broken, or missing lid/wheels or cracks/holes in the container)? Containers damaged because of normal use will be replaced or repaired free of charge.

Note: When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool for at least 48 – 72 hours before disposing in a metal container then placing them in the trash. **NEVER place hot coals/ashes in the refuse/recycling barrels.**



If containers have been deliberately destroyed or vandalized by the resident/homeowner there will be a replacement charge. Automated containers are the property of the City's franchised hauler. They are provided to each household, but they do not belong to the resident or property owner.

Know How to Shut Off Utilities



Natural Gas - Natural gas leaks and explosions cause a significant number of fires after disasters. It's important that all household members know how to shut off natural gas.

There are different gas shut-off procedures for different gas meter configurations, so it's important to call your gas company. They can help you prepare for gas appliances and gas service to your home in the event of an emergency. Make sure everyone in your household knows the proper shut-off procedure for your meter. Do not actually turn off the gas when practicing shutting it off.

- If you smell gas or hear a blowing or hissing noise, open a window, and get everyone out quickly.
- Turn off the gas using the outside main valve if you can and call the gas company from a neighbor's home. Caution: If you turn off the gas for any reason, only a qualified professional can turn it back on. NEVER attempt to turn the gas back on yourself.

Water - Water quickly becomes a precious resource following many disasters. It is important that everyone in your household learn how to shut off the main water valve to the house.

- Find the shut-off valve for the main water line that enters your house and tag it for easy identification. Make sure everyone in your household knows where it is.
- Make sure you can shut the valve off completely. Your valve may be rusted open, or it may not close all the way. If so, replace it.
- Cracked lines may pollute the water supply to your house. It's a good idea to shut off your water until authorities say it's safe to drink.

The effects of gravity may drain the water in your hot water heater and toilet tanks unless you trap it in your house by shutting off the main house valve. (This is not the street valve in the cement box at the curb – the street valve is extremely difficult to turn and requires a special tool.)

Electricity - Electrical sparks can ignite natural gas if it is leaking. Teach all responsible household members how to shut off the electricity. Locate your electrical circuit box. For your safety, always shut off all the individual circuits before shutting off the main circuit.

SENIORS WANTED!

Are you a Highland resident and sixty (60) years of age or older? If so, then you are eligible to receive a senior discount on trash service. Senior citizen rates are equivalent to a twenty percent (20%) discount to the individuals who meet the following criteria: 1) Over sixty (60) years of age, 2) residing as head of household, 3) Single Family residence only. **Note: proof of items a-c is required**

Refuse Collection Information

Containers must be placed at the curb for service by 5:30 a.m. the day of collection to ensure service. Between collection days residents are encouraged to store carts on your property, either in garages or behind fences.

Street Sweeping

The street sweeper in residential areas can sweep anytime from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., the next business day after your trash day. If trash pickup is delayed one day due to a holiday, the street sweeper will be delayed one day as well. Residents are encouraged to move parked vehicles from the street on sweeping day to ensure clean streets for Highland.

Stormwater Pollution

Anything thrown, swept or poured into the gutter or catch basin can flow directly into our creeks and eventually the ocean. This includes pollutants like trash, pet waste, cigarette butts, motor oil, anti-freeze, pesticides and fertilizers, paint from brushes, containers rinsed in the gutter and toxic household chemicals. Unlike sewage, which goes to a treatment plant, stormwater pollution flows untreated through the storm drain system. Contaminated runoff pollutes our drinking water and waterways, making them unsafe for people and wildlife.

The City of Highland is encouraging small businesses in Highland to apply for the Coronavirus Recovery Fund grant program. First launched in September 2021, the purpose of this program is to provide financial assistance to City-based small businesses impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Successful grant recipients will receive a one-time \$7,500 disbursement.

Businesses that meet these specific criteria are eligible for consideration:

- Must have a physical location within the City of Highland (store front, office, commercial structure).
- Be in good standing with the City of Highland (**current/valid business license, no outstanding code enforcement actions, or compliance orders**).
- Must have no more than 100 employees.
- Must be in existence as of August 24, 2021.






TIPS

DANGER SIGNS

Hot weather can be dangerous and even deadly. Precautions must be taken to ensure health and safety during our summer months. A person suffering from the heat may not realize it. Be aware of the warning signs of heat related illness, which include:

- Heat cramps: Painful muscle contractions, usually in the hamstring muscles.
- Heat exhaustion: Dizziness, fatigue, headache, rapid/weak pulse, pale or clammy skin.
- Heatstroke: Hot/dry/flushed skin, high body temperature, rapid heartbeat and confusion.

PREVENTION TIPS

- Drink plenty of water. Carry a bottle with you when you are away from home.
- Wear loose fitting cotton clothing and hats with wide brims and carry an umbrella.
- Check with your doctor. Heat may affect your reaction to certain medications.
- Keep electric lights low or off, shades drawn and blinds closed and limit oven use.
- Stay in well-ventilated areas. Circulation of air helps you keep cool.
- Open a window or turn on a fan or air conditioner.
- Have a friend check up on you at different times of the day when it is very hot.
- Eat light meals and avoid alcohol and caffeine.
- Plan ahead so your outside activities are during the coolest part of the day.
- Avoid unnecessary activity and being in direct sunlight or a hot environment.
- Take your time. Do not run around in a hurry.
- Never wait in a car or leave people or pets in a car.
- Remember, excessive heat exposure can result in illness or death!

CONSEJOS

SEÑALES DE PELIGRO

El clima caliente puede ser peligroso y hasta mortal. Se deben tomar precauciones para asegurar la salud y seguridad durante los meses de verano. Es posible que una persona sufriendo del calor no se dé cuenta. Este consciente de las señales de advertencia de enfermedad relacionada con el calor, que incluyen:

- ▶ Calambres por el calor: contracciones musculares dolorosas, generalmente en el músculo de la corva.
- ▶ Agotamiento por el calor: Mareos, fatiga, dolor de cabeza, pulso rápido/débil, piel pálida/húmeda.
- ▶ Insolación: piel caliente/seca/enrojecida, alta temperatura del cuerpo, latidos cardíacos rápidos y confusión.

CONSEJOS DE PREVENCIÓN

- ▶ Tome suficiente agua. Lleve una botella de agua con usted cuando esté fuera de casa.
- ▶ Use ropa floja de algodón y sombreros de ala ancha y lleve un paraguas.
- ▶ Consulte con su doctor. El calor puede afectar su reacción a ciertos medicamentos.
- ▶ Mantenga las luces eléctricas bajas o apagadas, las cortinas bajadas y persianas cerradas y limite el uso del horno.
- ▶ Permanezca en zonas bien ventilados. La circulación de aire ayuda a mantenerse fresco.
- ▶ Abra una ventana o encienda un ventilador o aire acondicionado.
- ▶ Pídale a un amigo que lo visite a diferentes horas del día cuando este muy caliente.
- ▶ Coma comidas ligeras y evite el alcohol y la cafeína.
- ▶ Planee con anticipación actividades de aire libre durante las horas más frescas del día.
- ▶ Evite actividades innecesarias y estar bajo el sol o un ambiente caliente.
- ▶ Tómese su tiempo. No corra de prisa.
- ▶ Nunca espere en un automóvil o deje personas o mascotas en un automóvil.
- ▶ ¡Recuerde, exposición excesiva al calor puede resultar en enfermedad o muerte!
