Administration

Highland Police and Fire Departments wish to remind you that fireworks (safe and sane included) are not permitted within the City of Highland city limits. It is a violation to own, use or sell any type of fireworks within the City of Highland. Use of fireworks may result in a citation and fine of \$1,000 or arrest.

The Highland Police and Fire Departments will have extra officers working over the July 4th Holiday period. Fireworks will be confiscated and violators may be cited or arrested. Possession of explosive devices exceeding 50 milligrams is a felony. Individuals may be held liable for damages (and parents may be held liable for damages caused by their children) resulting from use of fireworks and for costs of a response by the Fire and Police Department.




HOW TO BE A STORMWATER HERO

What is Stormwater?

Stormwater is rain, snow melt, or irrigation water that flows across impervious surfaces and eventually reaches our waterways. Stormwater is not treated before being released into the environment. That's why it's so important to make sure that we keep stormwater clean of pollutants – to protect our health and the environment.

How can you prevent stormwater pollution in your home and garden?

Stormwater runoff is susceptible to picking up all sorts of pollutants on its way to the ocean or local bodies of water. Common stormwater pollutants include trash, pet waste, motor oil, pesticides, and other chemicals. These pollutants pose a serious health risk to people swimming or fishing in our water bodies as well as to wildlife.

Here are some tips on how we can all do our part to prevent stormwater pollution:

- Dispose of trash in the proper bins, and make sure your trash bin lids are secure.
- Always pick up after your pet. Order a free doggie bag canister here: <https://sbcountystormwater.org/residents/dog-owners/> so you never find yourself without a poop bag.
- Reduce the use of pesticides and fertilizers in your garden. Find tips for less-toxic alternatives here: <https://sbcountystormwater.org/residents/gardeners/>
- Always dispose of Household Hazardous Waste (such as paint, household cleaners, motor oil, etc.) at HHW collection centers. Find your nearest HHW collection center here: <https://sbcountystormwater.org/residents/toxic-items/household-hazardous-waste-collection-locations/>

Capturing and Conserving Stormwater

Stormwater is also a valuable resource. Especially as drought becomes more common, capturing and conserving rainwater can help reduce our reliance on potable water. Here are some tips for making the most of the scarce but free rainwater that falls on our gardens:

- Apply mulch and compost to your garden. This will create nutritious soil and help your soil capture and retain water.
- Install a rain barrel or rain cistern to capture rainwater and save it to use in drier months. You may even qualify for a rebate to subsidize the cost of your water capture system. Check with your local water agency to find what rebates are available to you.

SWIMMING SAFETY TIPS

Swimming is a life skill that everyone should have, but there is more to it than just knowing basic swimming skills. Here are some swimming safety tips whether you are just starting to learn to be water competent or improving your skills and endurance:

Swimming Safety Tips

- Provide close and constant attention to children you are supervising in or near water.
- Swim in designated areas supervised by lifeguards. Always swim with a buddy; do not allow anyone to swim alone.
- Provide close and constant attention to children you are supervising, even when a lifeguard is present, no matter how well the child can swim or how shallow the water. Avoid distractions including cell phones.
- Never leave a young child unattended near water and do not trust a child's life to another child; teach children to always ask permission to go near water.
- Designate a "water watcher" whenever in a group setting.

Take Smart Precautions and Use Layers of Protection

- Stay within an arm's reach of any weak or inexperienced swimmer who is in the water.
- Have young children or inexperienced swimmers wear U.S. Coast Guard-approved life jackets around water, but do not rely on life jackets alone.
- Do not rely on the use of water wings, swim rings, inflatable toys or other items designed for water recreation to replace adult supervision.
- If you have a pool, secure it with appropriate barriers to prevent unsupervised access to the water.
- Many children who drown in home pools did so during non-swim times – when they were not expected to be in the water, including as the swimming activity was coming to an end and everyone was thought to be out of the water.
- Children were often out of sight for less than 5 minutes and in the care of one or both parents at the time.

Ensure that everyone in the family learns to swim well and what to do in a water emergency

- If a child is missing, check the water first. Seconds count in preventing death or disability.
- Know how and when to call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number.
- Have appropriate equipment, such as reaching or throwing equipment, a cell phone, life jackets and a first aid kit.

- Medications (excluding controlled substances, separate liquids from solids)
- Home-Generated Sharps/Needles in approved container
- Fluorescent Tubes
- E-Waste (Electronic Waste) such as: TVs & Computer Monitors, CPUs, Printers, Microwave Ovens, Cell/Mobile Phones, Telephones, Space Heaters, Stereos, Radios, VCRs/DVD Players, Musical Cards, Clothes Irons
- Mercury Thermostats
- Cooking Oil

ITEMS NOT ACCEPTED

- Business/Commercial Wastes
- Wastes from foreclosed properties and non-profit organizations
- Radioactive Wastes
- Medical Wastes other than Sharps
- Asbestos
- Explosives
- Reactives
- Tires, Appliances, Furniture, Air Conditioner, etc.

TRANSPORTATION GUIDELINES

Before transporting hazardous waste to a collection facility, be sure that:

- The amount of waste transported does not exceed 15 gallons or 125 lbs. per visit in containers no larger than 5 gallons.
- The waste is properly labeled as to its contents or in its original container.
- The containers are sound, not leaking and sealed.
- Wastes are placed securely in the vehicle for safe transport.
- The contents of the container are the same as stated on the label. If not, cover up the label and write the name of its contents.

HOT WEATHER

TIPS

DANGER SIGNS

Hot weather can be dangerous and even deadly. Precautions must be taken to ensure health and safety during our summer months. A person suffering from the heat may not realize it. Be aware of the warning signs of heat related illness, which include:

- Heat cramps: Painful muscle contractions, usually in the hamstring muscles.
- Heat exhaustion: Dizziness, fatigue, headache, rapid/weak pulse, pale or clammy skin.
- Heatstroke: Hot/dry/flushed skin, high body temperature, rapid heartbeat and confusion.

PREVENTION TIPS

- Drink plenty of water. Carry a bottle with you when you are away from home.
- Wear loose fitting cotton clothing and hats with wide brims and carry an umbrella.
- Check with your doctor. Heat may affect your reaction to certain medications.
- Keep electric lights low or off, shades drawn and blinds closed and limit oven use.
- Stay in well-ventilated areas. Circulation of air helps you keep cool.
- Open a window or turn on a fan or air conditioner.
- Have a friend check up on you at different times of the day when it is very hot.
- Eat light meals and avoid alcohol and caffeine.
- Plan ahead so your outside activities are during the coolest part of the day.
- Avoid unnecessary activity and being in direct sunlight or a hot environment.
- Take your time. Do not run around in a hurry.
- Never wait in a car or leave people or pets in a car.
- Remember, excessive heat exposure can result in illness or death!

CONSEJOS

SEÑALES DE PELIGRO

El clima caliente puede ser peligroso y hasta mortal. Se deben tomar precauciones para asegurar la salud y seguridad durante los meses de verano. Es posible que una persona sufriendo del calor no se dé cuenta. Este consciente de las señales de advertencia de enfermedad relacionada con el calor, que incluyen:

- ▶ Calambres por el calor: contracciones musculares dolorosas, generalmente en el músculo de la corva.
- ▶ Agotamiento por el calor: Mareos, fatiga, dolor de cabeza, pulso rápido/débil, piel pálida/húmeda.
- ▶ Insolación: piel caliente/seca/enrojecida, alta temperatura del cuerpo, latidos cardíacos rápidos y confusión.

CONSEJOS DE PREVENCIÓN

- ▶ Tome suficiente agua. Lleve una botella de agua con usted cuando esté fuera de casa.
- ▶ Use ropa floja de algodón y sombreros de ala ancha y lleve un paraguas.
- ▶ Consulte con su doctor. El calor puede afectar su reacción a ciertos medicamentos.
- ▶ Mantenga las luces eléctricas bajas o apagadas, las cortinas bajadas y persianas cerradas y limite el uso del horno.
- ▶ Permanezca en zonas bien ventilados. La circulación de aire ayuda a mantenerse fresco.
- ▶ Abra una ventana o encienda un ventilador o aire acondicionado.
- ▶ Pídale a un amigo que lo visite a diferentes horas del día cuando este muy caliente.
- ▶ Coma comidas ligeras y evite el alcohol y la cafeína.
- ▶ Planee con anticipación actividades de aire libre durante las horas más frescas del día.
- ▶ Evite actividades innecesarias y estar bajo el sol o un ambiente caliente.
- ▶ Tómese su tiempo. No corra de prisa.
- ▶ Nunca espere en un automóvil o deje personas o mascotas en un automóvil.
- ▶ ¡Recuerde, exposición excesiva al calor puede resultar en enfermedad o muerte!



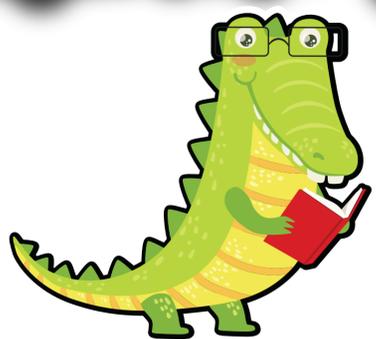

