



HIGHLAND WELCOMES MEDITERRA PARK

THE ANNUAL GREAT SHAKEOUT DRILL

The International ShakeOut Day is set for October 17 2024, at 10:17am. The ShakeOut originally began in California, and later expanded into many other states and countries.

It is especially timely, to conduct this drill given the recent increase in seismic activity in Southern California. The region has experienced a notable uptick in small earthquakes over the past few years, raising concerns about potential larger earthquakes.

The drill will include participants from cities across the country, including Highland. Local schools, businesses, and community groups will engage in the "drop, Cover, and Hold On" drill to ensure earthquake preparedness.

Residents in Highland can benefit from their participation in this drill by reducing risks during seismic events due to the city's proximity to fault lines.

Residents are encouraged to familiarize themselves with available resources, such as the MyShake Earthquake Early Warning App, which provides alerts when an earthquake is detected, giving people precious seconds to take protective action.

To prepare further, residents should create emergency kits with essentials such as water, non-perishable food, flashlights, medications, and first-aid supplies. Families are also encouraged to have an emergency communication plan in place in case cell towers go down during an earthquake.

Participants can register for the drill at shakeout.org, helping to build earthquake awareness and resilience across the region.

Highland already counts with 7 public parks for the residents and visitors to enjoy. Highland's broader goal is to offer community beautification and recreational amenities.

GREENSPOT ROAD MEDIAN AND PARKWAY IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT

Soon Highland will have another project under construction. Advertisement of the Greenspot Road Median and Parkway Improvements Project located between Boulder Avenue and SR-210 interchange is scheduled this week, with a bid opening on October 30.

This Project will improve access to and from the new Costco and the neighboring shopping center by modifying the median to include 300-foot dual eastbound left turn lanes onto the site at the Chevron intersection, constructing a 200-foot westbound dedicated right turn pocket at the driveway entrance, re-striping the right turn pocket for westbound SR-210 on ramp to allow for two dual right turn pockets, and re-striping the eastbound center stripe to lengthen the eastbound left turn lane to 330-feet at the Lowe's intersection.


The Public Works Department expects to bring the Project to City Council for award at the next City Council meeting on November 12. Weather permitting, the target completion for construction would be late February or early March of 2025, to coincide with the grand opening for Costco.

ALARM SAFETY TIPS

What is the most important thing to remember when installing a smoke alarm or carbon monoxide alarm? Location, location, location!

SMOKE ALARM SAFETY

- Install at least one smoke alarm in every bedroom, outside of each sleeping room area and on each level of a multi-level building.
- Test each smoke alarm regularly.
- Keep batteries fresh by replacing them annually.
- Check the manufacturer date on your smoke alarm. Replace if it is over 10 years old.




Smoke alarms can't help you unless they are functional, and you can hear them. Building safety codes require smoke alarms. Contact your local building safety department for more information.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARM SAFETY

- Install a CO alarm in the hallway outside of each sleeping room area and in bedrooms containing fuel burning appliances or fireplaces.
- Test each CO alarm regularly in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- Permanently wired or plug-in CO alarms should have a battery backup. Keep batteries fresh by replacing them annually.
- CO alarms can't help you unless they are functional, and you can hear them. Building safety codes require CO alarms in all dwelling units that contain a fuel-fired appliance and dwelling units that have an attached garage.

CYBERSECURITY AWARENESS

PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST CYBER ATTACKS



You can avoid cyber risks by setting up the proper controls. The following are things you can do to protect yourself, your family, and your property before a cyberattack occurs:

- Limit the personal information you share online. Change privacy settings and do not use location features.
- Keep software applications and operating systems up to date.
- Using a password manager, use upper and lowercase letters, numbers and special characters, as well as two-factor authentication (two methods of verification).
- Watch for suspicious activity that asks you to do something right away, offers something that sounds too good to be true or needs your personal information. Think before you click, and when in doubt, do NOT click. Do not provide personal information.
- Use encrypted (secure) Internet communications.
- Protect your home and/or business using a secure Internet connection and Wi-Fi network.
- Use a stronger authentication such as a personal identification number (PIN) or password that only you would know. Consider using a separate device that can receive a code or uses a biometric scan (e.g., fingerprint scanner or facial recognition).
- Check your account statements and credit reports regularly.
- Only share personal information on secure sites (e.g., "https://"). Do not use sites with invalid certificates. Use a Virtual Private Network (VPN) that creates a more secure connection.
- Use antivirus solutions, malware, and firewalls to block threats.
- Regularly back up your files in an encrypted file or encrypted file storage device.
- Protect your home network by changing the administrative and Wi-Fi passwords regularly. When configuring your router, use either the instruction manual or speak to your internet-cable provider, to setup the Wi-Fi Protected Access 2 (WPA2) Advanced Encryption Standard (AES) setting, which is the strongest encryption option.


