



EXTRA SPACE STORAGE UNDER CONSTRUCTION

SAFETY TIPS FOR HIGH WIND CONDITIONS

Strong Southern California wind patterns may produce High Wind Watches. These winds can topple trees, damage electrical equipment and cause power outages. Follow these tips to ensure that you and your loved ones are safe, and your home or business is ready when powerful gusts hit Southern California. Here are some safety tips SCE recommends for high wind conditions and possible power outages:

- Check emergency supplies to ensure you have a battery-operated radio, a flashlight and fresh batteries.
- If you see a downed power line, do not touch it or anything in contact with it. Call 911 immediately.
- Never try to remove a broken tree limb or branch that has come in contact with a power line.
- Power outages in the area may impact traffic signals, so motorists should use extreme caution and treat all intersections as four-way stops during an outage.
- If you are in a vehicle with a fallen power line on it, remain calm and stay inside until help arrives. It is okay to use your cellphone to call 911. If you must leave the vehicle, remember to exit away from downed power lines and exit by jumping and landing with both feet together. Do not touch the vehicle and the ground at the same time. Proceed away from the vehicle by shuffling and not picking up your feet until you are several yards away.
- Use flashlights instead of candles to avoid fire hazards in your home or business.
- If you use a generator, place it outdoors and plug individual appliances directly into it, using a heavy-duty extension cord. Connecting generators directly to household circuits creates a "backfeed," which is dangerous to repair crews.
- Do not use any equipment inside that is designed for outdoor heating or cooking.

WHERE WATER MEETS COMMUNITY

NATIONAL PRESCRIPTION DRUG TAKE BACK DAY

On October 26, 2024, the Highland Police Station and the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) gave the public its 26th opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs.

The successful event had a total of 40+ residents bring in their medications for disposal to the Highland Police Station. As long as the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) continues with this event, look for the next one to be sometime in April 2025.



Back in April of this year, the DEA and its state, local, and tribal law enforcement partners collected 335 tons of unwanted medicines at over 4,800 sites spread through all 50 states. This brings the total amount of prescription drugs collected by the DEA since the Fall of 2010 to 18,570,487 lbs or 9,285 tons.

SCE PUBLIC SAFETY POWER SHUTOFF

WHAT IS THE PUBLIC SAFETY POWER SHUTOFF?

The threat of wildfires in California is real and growing. With one-quarter of Southern California Edison's service area in high-risk fire areas, keeping our communities safe by preventing wildfires is a top priority.

One critical tool we use to prevent wildfires is the **Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS)**, in which we may temporarily shut off power to your neighborhood during dangerous weather conditions to prevent our electric system from becoming a source of ignition. These safety shutoffs are a measure of last resort for keeping you and your community safe.



A TOOL OF LAST RESORT

SCE bases PSPS decisions on data gathered from fire scientists and meteorologists forecasting dangerous wildfire conditions, and on real-time information from their crews in the field. They understand that a PSPS event can create hardships for affected customers, and the decision to shut off power is never taken lightly.

PREPARING FOR A PSPS EVENT

A PSPS event will last as long as the dangerous fire weather conditions persist. When weather improves, SCE will inspect their lines for damage before restoring power. This typically takes up to eight hours but could take longer if they need daylight for safe inspections.

DRIVER LICENSE RENEWAL FOR 70+


Recently the California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) announced that drivers 70 years old and older, whose licenses expire in 2024 and beyond, will no longer be required to take a written knowledge test.

For those renewing their license who are 70 and older, an office visit is still required for a vision exam and updated photo. Some renewal notices for licenses that expire in 2024 may indicate a written test is required, but it will be waived during the in-office visit.

The DMV wants to help seniors maintain and continue their driving independence and ensure driver safety.

You can visit the DMV's website at www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/ for the following services:

- Simple vehicle registration renewals that are not past the due date nor require an address change.
- Driver's license renewals that do not require an in-person visit.
- Requests for copies of vehicle registration records, which show a vehicle's ownership history.
- Requests for copies of driver's license records, which show a driver's history.
- Replacing a lost or stolen driver's license card.



TELEPHONE EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION SYSTEM (TENS)

In an effort to quickly communicate information on impending dangers, the San Bernardino County Sheriff and Fire Departments send high-speed mass notifications via telephone and text messages. This system is known as the Telephone Emergency Notification System (TENS).



The County uses a database of landline telephone numbers, which is updated every six months, to send emergency messages to landline phones only. By signing up, residents can also receive emergency text messages on their cell phones, add voice over internet phone numbers (V.O.I.P.), and manage their own account using a valid email address. If you are interested in signing up for alerts, please visit sbcfire.org/alertwarning. Those without internet connections can sign up by calling (909)356-3998, Monday through Friday, 8:00am to 5:00pm. Please ask for TENS registration support.

TENS alerts do not generally go out to the entire county but instead are targeted to affected areas. You must enter a valid San Bernardino County address. This is the address for which you will receive alerts.

SAN BERNARDINO READY APP (SB READY)



The San Bernardino Community Preparedness App helps citizens of the San Bernardino County to stay prepared and protect their loved ones should an emergency occur.

Some of the features include:

- Five-step family emergency plan creation wizard
- Important News and timely alerts from your county
- Live information on evacuation routes and shelters
- One-button status sharing
- Library of emergency preparedness eGuides

Be prepared and get alerts when it's time to evacuate, create your emergency supply kit and your evacuation plan.

TIPS FOR A SAFE THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving is a time for gratitude, great food and quality time with loved ones. As you gather with your loved ones, it's crucial to remember that safety should be on the menu as well. Read the following tips to help you make this Thanksgiving as safe as it will be delicious.

PREVENT FOOD POISONING

When preparing food for family and friends, it's important to keep food fresh and safe to eat. By following food handling guidelines, you can prevent common causes of food poisoning.

Keep produce separate from meat, poultry, seafood and eggs in your shopping cart and in your grocery bags. Store and serve food at the right temperature. Food should be stored below 40 degrees Fahrenheit and cooked to the proper internal temperature. Remember to refrigerate food within two hours of purchase of preparation and to always thaw food safely in the refrigerator, in a cold-water bath, or in the microwave. Wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds before preparing or serving food.

Wash utensils, cutting boards and counters that have touched uncooked or undercooked meat, poultry, seafood, eggs or flour before using them on anything that will be served raw.



HOME HEATING SAFETY

While we are in the midst of changing seasons and fluctuating temperatures, it's important to make sure your home heating system is in good working order. Heating fires remained the second leading cause of home fires in 2021 with an estimated 32,200 home heating fires reported across the country. Make sure your home heating system is inspected by a professional to ensure it is in proper working order.

If you're using wood stoves, fireplaces or space heaters, keep them at a safe distance from flammable materials and never leave them unattended. Maintain your heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected prior to use each year.



TRAVEL SAFETY

If you're hitting the road for Thanksgiving, ensure you are well-prepared for what travels lay ahead. Make sure your car is in good working order for a road trip, pack an emergency preparedness kit and check the weather before departing. If you are traveling alone, be sure to share your travel plans with someone and take plenty of breaks throughout your journey to ensure you're fully rested and alert.

If you are using public transportation, such as a flight or a train, check that you have what you need for wherever you are visiting. Make sure to consider weather conditions or required immunizations.

HOLIDAY ONLINE SHOPPING SAFETY

While Thanksgiving is a time to be with friends and family, it also heralds the holiday shopping season. While shopping for Black Friday deals, only visit reputable websites and don't click suspicious links or emails, including unverified merchants on social media.
