



ADOPTED BUDGET



At the City Council Meeting on June 24, the City of Highland officially adopted its Biennial Budget for Fiscal Years 2025-2027. City officials have highlighted that the new budget ensures continued investment in essential services, infrastructure, and community development while maintaining fiscal discipline.

The City Council reviewed in detail the proposed Biennial Budget including the 5-year Capital Improvement Program at the May 21, 2025 City Council Study Session. During the Study Session, direction was provided to revise the Police Department budget to include funding for three Deputy positions in the first year and two additional Deputies in the second year. The Fire/Paramedic Department budget was also updated to incorporate staff changes with CalFIRE.

The budget reflects the Work Program and includes an aggressive Capital Improvement Program (CIP) with updated construction costs to maintain and enhance infrastructure throughout the city.

The City of Highland's mission statement reads: Highland is dedicated to the betterment of the individual, the family, the neighborhood and the community. The City Council and the staff of Highland are dedicated to providing the quality of public facilities and services that its citizens are willing to fund and will do so as efficiently as possible. This budget once again is a direct reflection of the Highland mission statement.

WELCOME HOME STATER BROS. MARKET

On June 25, Stater Bros. Market officially opened their newest market on Greenspot Road within the new Greenspot Crossing Shopping Center. A convenient location directly off the SR-210 freeway at the 5th Street/Greenspot Road exit.

On that morning, local officials, city staff and hundreds of residents attended the Ribbon Cutting Ceremony and were entertained by the Citrus Valley High School Band.

The new location replaced the location previously on Highland Avenue and Palm Avenue which served the community for over 45 years. The new store is close to double the size and features full-service meat, seafood, service deli and bakery departments, including fresh sushi and fresh cut fruit stations



Representatives from Stater Bros corporation introduced their teams and presented to six local non-profit organizations with \$30,000 in grants during the event. The organizations receiving donations were the Highland Senior Center, Boys and Girls Club, Citrus Valley High School Band, Loma Linda University Pediatric Clinic, American Legion Post 421 and the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Council. This demonstrates Stater Bros.'s commitment to the community.

On July 2, Pat's Place opened its doors and began serving its much-anticipated "Louisiana Soul Food Cuisine".


The Highland Planning Commission approved the restoration of this building at Base Line and McKinley Avenue in June 2020.

SCE PUBLIC SAFETY POWER SHUTOFF



A Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS) is when Southern California Edison (SCE) temporarily shuts off power to reduce the risk of a fire caused by utility equipment. Losing power for any amount of time is a hardship; while it's frustrating and inconvenient, safety must come first.

When does SCE turn off power for PSPS?

SCE will turn off power for PSPS during dangerous fire weather conditions such as strong winds, dry vegetation, or low humidity. Under these conditions, a fire could spread rapidly posing a significant safety risk. PSPS reduces the risk of winds causing branches or other debris from coming into contact with utility equipment and starting a fire.

Who is most at risk for PSPS outages?

Customers who live in high fire risk areas are more likely to experience PSPS. However, customers who live near high fire risk areas may also be affected because they are connected to power lines that run through or near high fire risk areas.

Why does my neighbor have power and I don't?

While some residents may not be experiencing high winds at their home or business, they may be served by a circuit which starts in or crosses a windy high fire risk area before reaching their address. As a result, one block or neighborhood may have power while others don't. Also, all circuits must be visually inspected by crews on the ground before restoration so not all circuits will be restored at the same time.

Sign up for alerts to be prepared before a potential PSPS. SCE will send notifications via email, text or phone message. Sign up or update your contact information for PSPS alerts by visiting <https://www.sce.com/outages-safety/outage-center/get-alerts>.



RECOGNIZE SIGNS OF HEAT ILLNESS

Know the signs of heat-related illnesses and ways to respond. If you are sick and need medical attention, contact your healthcare provider for advice and shelter in place if you can. If you are experiencing a medical emergency call 9-1-1.

SIGNS OF HEAT STROKE

- Extremely high body temperature (above 103 degrees F) taken orally
- Red, hot and dry skin with no sweat
- Rapid, strong pulse
- Dizziness, confusion or unconsciousness

If you suspect heat stroke, call 9-1-1 or get the person to a hospital immediately. If possible: move the person suffering from heat stroke into a cool, shaded area; remove any outer clothing; place a cold wet cloth or ice pack on the head, neck, armpits and groin, or soak the person's clothing with cool water; elevating their feet.

SIGNS OF HEAT CRAMPS

- Muscle pains or spasms in the stomach, arms or legs


SIGNS OF HEAT EXHAUSTION

- Heavy sweating, paleness, muscle cramps, tiredness, weakness, fast or weak pulse, dizziness, headache, fainting, nausea, vomiting

If you have signs of heat cramps or heat exhaustion, go to a cooler location and cool down by removing excess clothing and taking sips of sports drinks or water. Call your healthcare provider if symptoms get worse or last more than an hour.

IMPORTANT SAFETY TIPS FOR EXTREME HEAT - STAY PREPARED FOR EXTREME HEAT

There is hot, and then there is hot! Extreme heat is a period of high heat and humidity with temperatures above 90 degrees for at least two to three days. In extreme heat your body works extra hard to maintain a normal temperature, which can lead to death. Extreme heat is responsible for the highest number of annual deaths among all weather-related hazards.



Older adults, children and people with certain illnesses and chronic conditions are at greater risk from extreme heat. Humidity increases the feeling of heat.

PREPARE FOR EXTREME HEAT

1. Learn to recognize the signs of heat illness. Signs of heat illness can be found on the left-hand panel.
2. Do not rely on a fan as your primary cooling device. Fans create air flow and a false sense of comfort, but do not reduce body temperature or prevent heat-related illnesses.
3. Identify places in your community where you can go to get cool such as libraries and shopping malls or contact your local health department to find cooling options in your area.
4. Cover windows with drapes or shades.
5. Weather-strip doors and windows.
6. Use window reflectors specifically designed to reflect heat back outside.
7. Add insulation to keep the heat out.
8. Use a powered attic ventilator, or attic fan, to regulate the heat level of a building's attic by clearing out hot air.
9. Install window air conditioners and insulate around them.
10. If you are unable to afford your cooling costs, weatherization or energy-related home repairs, please visit <https://www.csd.ca.gov/Pages/Residential-Energy-Efficiency.aspx> to find assistance through the Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP).

BE SAFE DURING

1. Never leave people or pets in a closed car on a warm day.
2. If air conditioning is not available in your home find a cooling option.
3. Take cool showers or baths.
4. Wear loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.
5. Use your oven less to help reduce the temperature in your home.
6. If you're outside, find shade. Wear a hat wide enough to protect your face.
7. Drink plenty of fluids to stay hydrated.
8. Avoid high-energy activities or work outdoors, during midday heat, if possible.
9. Check on family members, older adults and neighbors.
10. Watch for heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke.
11. Consider pet safety. If they are outside, make sure they have plenty of cool water and access to comfortable shade. Asphalt and dark pavement can be very hot to your pet's feet.


